These wide-ranging topics reflects his diverse interests in language, identity, education and the role of the media.

These insights highlight the need for targeted population-, place-, and time-based policy interventions and provide a benchmark for monitoring policy effectiveness.

 - Carnegie on the Contours of Precarity in Southeast Asia: Associate Professor Paul J. Carnegie of the Institute of Asian Studies at Universiti Brunei Darussalam (IAS @ UBD) recently published a paper in Pacific Affairs on Contours of Precarity in Southeast Asia. Drawing on detailed observations over several years, combined with a review of relevant literature and the use of illustrative examples, the paper details how and why the concept of precarity is particularly useful for understanding contemporary forms of jeopardy in Southeast Asia. This conceptual shift is arguably crucial for understanding and mitigating vulnerabilities. Rather than relying on limited frames of reference, a grounded and disaggregated precarity perspective can bring greater awareness to localized distress stemming from untrammelled accumulation, extractive activities, speculative development, and indebtedness and help decipher the less acknowledged forces and interests shaping circumstances we seek to prevent.

 - Carnegie on Disaster, Risk and Human Security in Southeast Asia: Associate Professor Paul J. Carnegie of the Institute of Asian Studies at Universiti Brunei Darussalam (IAS @ UBD) recently published an article on disaster, risk and conducting human security research in Southeast Asia: A Multidisciplinary Journal. This paper analyses the political, environmental and economic drivers amplifying exposure to disaster in Southeast Asia. While typhoons, storm surges and sea-level rise pose major risks to life and livelihoods and demand state-level action, the prominence and frequency of these symptomatic disasters often divert attention from underlying systemic and situational issues. The study findings reveal that the vulnerability and insecurity experienced by at-risk communities are not wholly random or exclusively the result of natural, unavoidable events. Exposure to disasters is also shaped by various situational factors, including habitat loss, dispossession, displacement, marginalisation and limited opportunities. The study underscores the importance of this appreciation for advancing appropriate responses.

 - Ade Roddiane and Carnegie on IUU fishing in Brunei's EEZ: Associate Professor Paul J. Carnegie of the Institute of Asian Studies at Universiti Brunei Darussalam (IAS @ UBD) recently co-authored an internally classified article on combatting illegal fishing in Brunei's Exclusive Economic Zone with Cmdr. Ade Roddiane bin Haji Mohd Rosdi, Royal Brunei Navy for the MINDEF's Frontier Journal to coincide with 63rd Royal Brunei Armed Forces Day. The study examines the challenges of protecting Brunei's vital territorial waters from the threat of illegal fishing. It identifies strategies to tackle illegal, unregulated, and unreported fishing activities in Brunei's Exclusive Economic Zone. In doing so, the study highlights the importance of stakeholder involvement, maritime coordination and information sharing in maintaining food security and developing a sustainable fisheries industry into the future.



 - Professor LEE Cheuk Yin's new book, entitles Chinese Culture and Daily Life (in Chinese, 文化與生活), has been published by City University of Hong Kong Press in January 2025. The book is a collection of 12 academic papers on Chinese culture which include: Legend and Reality- Zheng He in Southeast Asia; History and Imagination- The Image of Confucius in Historical Writings and its Creation; Knowledge and Taste- The Gold Fish Breeding Culture of the Ming Literati; and Tradition and Innovation- The Traditional New Year Prints in the New Age.





Professor KWEN Fee Lian

- Kwen, F.L., & Alas, Y. (2025): When is a Dusun a Dusun: Ethnic Formation in Brunei, Asian Ethnicity, DOI: 10.1080/14631369.2025.2484008.
 - This paper examines how the Dusun in Brunei have been constructed by colonists and census categories used by colonial and post-colonial governments and how they have been represented by scholars. Drawing on interviews with informants from selected lowland Dusun communities in Tutong, we discuss how the Dusun themselves make sense of their identity against the backdrop of social and economic changes in the 1950s-1990s, as Brunei transitioned from colonial administration to an independent and modern economy. By triangulating the three contrasting perspectives, we reflect on Dusun ethnic formation and deconstruct existing notions of Dusun-ness. Colonial ascription has given way to self-identification through the gradual process of nation-building even though the ties of kinship and residential proximity are still meaningful to the Dusun. We argue that essentializing Dusun-ness does not reflect their self-identification, which is multi-faceted, multicultural, and heterogenous.

 - Statism and State Activism in Response to China's Belt and Road Initiative: Indonesia and Malaysia's EV Sector: In her latest publication, Dr Tritto investigates how Indonesia and Malaysia strategically engaged with Chinese investments under the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) to develop their electric vehicle (EV) sectors. The study shows how both countries adopted different blends of state capitalism: Indonesia leaned toward statism, using industrial policies and regulatory tools to restructure its nickel sector for EV battery production; Malaysia embraced state activism, fostering joint ventures like the Proton-Geely partnership. Both cases highlight the agency of host countries in directing Chinese FDI toward national goals, though unintended socio-environmental consequences remain a concern. This study published in Competition and Change has created a new conceptualization of how the BRI promotes state capitalism efforts.

 - In this study, co-authored with colleague Dr Haini and her former student Hongsen Wu, Dr Tritto provides the first empirical study of China's Covid-19 medical assistance and its links with recipient countries' positions on China's key human rights issues. The analysis reveals that countries supporting China on issues like Hong Kong and Xinjiang at the UN received significantly more aid—up to 174% more medical equipment and 205% more vaccines. While the association was strongest during the early stages of the pandemic, the study also shows that some countries later shifted their stance, raising questions about the long-term impact of geopolitical aid. The findings suggest China's vaccine diplomacy was more politically driven than need-based. The study was published in World Development.

 - In this chapter Dr Tritto, together with soon-to-be Dr Anabela Rodrigues Santiago explore the evolving role of health cooperation as a core component of China's foreign assistance to Africa. Moving beyond infrastructure and trade, Tritto and Santiago highlight how medical aid—delivered through in-kind donations and dispatched health teams—serves not only humanitarian objectives but also broader geopolitical strategies. The authors frame this within China's vision of a "community of shared future for mankind," presenting health diplomacy as both a developmental tool and a soft power strategy. While this cooperation is largely bilateral, the chapter also discusses implications for trilateral partnerships with the EU and Africa. The work emphasizes that public health is becoming a key domain in shaping China-Africa relations and potentially redefining the terms of global development assistance. The work was published in the The Palgrave Handbook of China-Europe-Africa Relations (2025) edited by Yichao Li, Francisco José B. S. Leandro, Jorge Tavares da Silva, and Carlos Rodrigues.

Corruption and Illegality in Asian Investment Arbitration: AGC-IAS-SBE Book Launch and Symposium

On 28 May 2024, the Institute of Asian Studies at Universiti Brunei Darussalam (IAS @ UBD) co-organised a conference, "Corruption and Illegality in Asian Investment Arbitration: Book Launch and Symposium" with UBD School of Business and Economics (SBE) and the Attorney General's Chambers (AGC) at the Golden Jubilee Hall in the Law and Courts Building in Bandar Seri Begawan.

The IAS-SBE International Symposium on "Academic Perspectives on Corruption and Foreign Direct Investment in the Asia-Pacific Region" on 29 May 2023 has culminated in a conference volume entitled "Corruption and Illegality in Asian Investment Arbitration (Springer, 2024)". This AGC-IAS-SEB event celebrated the book's successful publication with invited chapter contributors and local experts, such as IAS Eminent Visiting Professors Dr Michael Hwang SC, Professors Luke Nottage and Simon Butt (Sydney Law School) and Justice Anselmo Reyes (Singapore International Commercial Court). The celebration was followed by knowledge-sharing sessions in which the contributors discussed diverse issues on corruption and other serious misconduct in Asian investor-state dispute settlement (ISDS), based on the book chapters but including the latest updates.

The symposium was attended by 100 speakers and guests from Brunei and abroad, including Attorney General Yang Berhormat Datin Paduka Dayang Hajah Nor Hashimah binti Haji Mohammed Taib (who kindly launched the book) as the guest of honour, and Vice Chancellor Dr Hazri bin Haji Kifle and Solicitor General Hajah Zuraini binti Haji Sharbawi as distinguished guests.

This event was organised by Assistant Professor Dr Nobumichi Teramura and Associate Professor Dr Bruno Jetin of IAS, with administrative support from IAS Director Dk Dr Noor Hasharina binti Pg Hj Hassan (IAS Director), Datin Paduka Dayang Hajah Suhana binti Haji Sudin (AGC) and Siti Munirah binti Abu Bakar (AGC).
